

Women have played both vital and vibrant roles in Greeley's storied history. Entrepreneurs, educators, community advocates, creative artists, mothers, civic leaders, and of course, pioneers — women of Greeley made a mark on history and set the stage for future generations. Possibly Greeley's most famous woman is Kate Slaughterback, better known as Rattlesnake Kate.

THE ORIGIN OF A HIGH PLAINS LEGEND

Although stranger than fiction, the tale of Kate Slaughterback facing down 140 rattlesnakes to save her son and horse is far from a tall tale. The iconic story resulted in "Rattlesnake Kate" defining the pioneering spirit of the early west and earning herself the iconic name and a place in Greeley's history books. She recently enjoyed a brief renaissance through her portrayal by UNC graduate, Grammy-nominated vocalist and musician and former Lumineers folk-band member Neyla Pekarek in "Rattlesnake Kate" the musical. Kate's rattlesnake dress, shoes, neck band, and inspiring story live on at the Greeley History Museum, and her pioneering spirit continues to pave the way for other notable Greeley women in today's world.

RHONDA SOLIS

What happens when you mix the desire to create a digital platform for Latinx voices with an interest in raising awareness about issues specific to their community? You get a wildly popular podcast focused on sharing stories of Latino Life in Northern Colorado. For longtime community advocate and Greeley civic leader Rhonda Solis, the "Latino Northern Colorado Podcast" is not just a successful entrepreneurial endeavor, it's an influential voice in a community that celebrates diversity, equity, and inclusivity. With her co-host and producer Cristobal Garcia, Rhonda invites listeners into their studio to discuss a wide array of topics — from mental illness to education access to economic resilience. And along the way, there's plenty of time for laughter and fun. Check it out and you'll find their podcast serves as a public square that pays homage to the rich history of Latinx culture in Northern Colorado.





SAMANTHA AND RYAN SMYTH

She was looking for a way to continue her ice hockey prowess despite a debilitating injury that left her paralyzed from the waist down. But it wasn't just the Greeley Ice Haus — with its special equipment, skilled instructors and generous ice time — that enticed Samantha Smyth to spend her Sundays in Greeley playing the adaptive sport of sled hockey. It was the open, welcoming environment and the city's relentless focus on inclusivity that won her over. Sled hockey was invented as an adaptive sport for players with lower-limb impairments. At the Greeley Ice Haus, Samantha finds camaraderie on and off the ice, and her able-bodied husband, Ryan, participates in the fun, too. Thanks to a committed city staff and accomplished hockey veterans, the sport is alive and well and available to all.

GREELEY COLORADO

FUN FOR ALL education hubs

In Greeley, you'll find a community passionate about caring for and preserving its resources, creating opportunities for the next generation through hands-on exploration and keeping past stories of those who came before us alive. Whether you prefer to take a trail at the Poudre Learning Center or observe small details at the Colorado Model Railroad Museum, learning has no age limit!





POUDRE LEARNING CENTER

On the western side of Greeley, situated along the banks of the Poudre River, the Poudre Learning Center (PLC) fosters an environment of wonder and discovery. The center serves more than 35,000 K-12 students annually, teaching environmental stewardship through hands-on experiences, such as observing erosion, sampling water quality and finding animal habitats. Programming opportunities for educators include field experiences at the center's 65-acre outdoor classroom, in-school presentations facilitated by center staff and self-directed programs utilizing the PLC's free trail system.

GREELEY HISTORY MUSEUM

Explore the lives and legacies that built a home on the high plains at the Greeley History Museum. Housed in the historical Greeley Tribune building, the museum showcases and preserves Greeley and Weld County history through permanent and temporary exhibits, community educational programs, ongoing research and collections. Researchers, genealogists and students can access the impressive collection of resources housed in the Hazel E. Johnson Research Center in the museum's lower level. With both artifacts and hands-on experiences, the Greeley History Museum creates inviting and meaningful experiences for every visitor.



Exhibits

Check out the museum's main exhibit, "Utopia: Adaptation on the Plains," and learn about how Greeley was once known as the "Athens of the West." Then head over to one of the museum's other galleries, which feature rotating themes throughout each year.

Coming Soon LINC LIBRARY

The Library Innovation Center (LINC) is a new, exciting development for downtown Greeley, designed to be a hub of creativity and possibility for both children and adults. The center will provide the resources, space and equipment for community

members to expand their horizons. Within the space, visitors will find a library, children's exhibit, community event space, interactive installations and so much more!

COLORADO MODEL RAILROAD MUSEUM

Tour America's most scenic model railroad — a 5,500 sq. feet masterpiece! This one-of-a-kind museum contains more than 500 scale locomotives, 80 scale miles of train track and around 28,000 trees. It also offers educational resources for the community such as Lego robotics workshops, a destination for school field trips, and summer camp programming. The museum setup allows visitors to view the multitude of miniature scenes from just inches away and hosts thousands of artifacts, including a 1919 Colorado and Southern Caboose.

CENTENNIAL VILLAGE MUSEUM

With 85 acres of beautifully landscaped grounds and historic structures, Centennial Village
Museum offers visitors an



immersive, living history experience. Learn about life on the high plains through the site's historical homes and buildings or watch a live demonstration of early west skills, such as blacksmithing or wood carving. The museum also hosts interactive, educational experiences for K-12 students and invites the community out to the village for annual events, including Baby Animal Days and Howl-O-Ween Trick or Treat.

Exhibits

Learn about early high plains living and westward expansion through structures like the Cheyenne-Arapaho tipi and "Rattlesnake" Kate Slaughterback's original one-room dwelling. View the immigrant story through buildings like the Spanish Colony House or take a stroll through Centennial Village's town square and 20th-century historical homes.



ACS CULTURE



CLAY CENTER

Tim Preston founded the Clay Center of Northern Colorado as a community gathering place, offering pottery classes, individualized instruction and studio space for Greeley artists. Recognizing that Greeley has a dynamic and vibrant art scene, Preston combines the seriousness of a professional studio with a personalized approach to artistic methods and critique. The relaxed, approachable atmosphere allows people to explore their inner creativity and experience the value of making art.

CREATIVE DISTRICT

The Greeley Creative District celebrates the distinct identity and cultural heart of Greeley, acting as an incubator for creatives, championing the arts and actively working to expand the services that allow creative visions to become livelihoods. It hosts several community events each year, such as the Do Tell! storytelling event and its Día De Los Muertos community

celebration. The district welcomes the partnerships of fellow creatives through board membership or participation in a Creative District committee.

GREELEY HAT WORKS

In the old days, they called it a millinery shop or hattery place; a business that custom-makes hats. Since 1909, it's been called Greeley Hat Works. For more than a century, Greeley Hat Works has designed, manufactured and sold high quality, hand-crafted hats to people from all walks of life. Owner, artist and self-described lover of hats Trent Johnson has continued the shop's legacy of hand-tooled expertise since taking over the business in 1996. His passion for quality and customer service demonstrates true Greeley tradition and excellence.





GALLERIES AROUND

Greeley may be known for its agricultural heritage and

pioneering pedigree, but its deep-seated, often-forgotten roots in the creative arts reveal a city brimming with artistic talent and inventive expression. Take Wonderhand Studios where co-owners Johanna Mueller and Stan Scott set out to make their printmaking studio a creative space for working artists. What they found was that Greeley offers creatives much more than other towns with exploding populations and rising rents. Greeley's grassroots, "funky" culture engenders inspiration, allowing artists to flourish.



FISHING

Surrounded by blue skies and a shaded section of the Poudre River Trail, this 80-acre lake is a hidden gem beloved by kayakers, paddleboarders, fishermen and hikers alike.

GOLF COURSES

Boomerang Links, an 18-hole links-style
championship course known for its plush
fairways and large greens.

TRAILS & OPEN SPACES

Greeley's open spaces are always in season. With more than 2,000 acres of natural areas and trails, our community comes with ample opportunities to relax, unwind and connect to nature. Spend the day on a bike touring the Poudre River Trail. Watch birds and deer along the river at sunrise or stroll through a quiet cottonwood forest with your best friends. Capture breathtaking mountain views from the crests of our west side hills. Just remember to be mindful of our open space residents: Greeley's natural areas also conserve and sustain important habitats for local wildlife.

POUDRE RIVER TRAIL

Extending from Island Grove Regional Park on Greeley's east side all the way northwest to Windsor, 21 miles of well-maintained paved pathway make up the Poudre River Trail. This meandering riverside corridor provides outdoor adventure for all ages. (And many species!) You can catch a trailhead from multiple spots around town to walk, run, ride or skate past the Poudre Ponds, the Signature Bluffs, the Poudre River Learning Center and more.

THE BEST FARMERS MARKET IN THE STATE

Real food. Real farmers. Real fun! Voted the best farmers market in Colorado, the small-but-mighty Greeley Farmers Market pays homage to our town's earliest agricultural roots. Selling everything from bison cuts and freshly poured kombucha to roasted chiles and Palisade peaches, farmers, bakers and makers come together year-round to offer fresh food and local produce to the Greeley community. Even better? Each week includes live entertainment performed by local musicians, and landscaping advice taught by the Weld County Master Gardeners from CSU Extension.

The Greeley market accepts WIC and SNAP benefits, and participates in the Double Up Food Bucks program, ensuring our entire community has access to fresh, local and often organic foods.


Nerds are having a moment, and in Greeley, they have a onestop shop for all things... nerdy. With comic books, graphic
